The Bells of St. Paul's



The choir has a history of many bell ringers and a number of directors. Over the years, the choir has performed in St. Paul's and other churches, in retirement homes and at special events.

Ann McMahon has been our director for the past several years.

The Bells of St. Paul's ring 3 octaves of bells (Schulmerich) and recently have added a G3 Bell donated by the choir's co-founder Mary Young in memory of her husband and choir co-founder Bruce Young.

How does a Handbell Choir Function?

Handbells are unique in that the bells can be considered to be one instrument requiring (in our case) eleven or twelve ringers. Each bell sounds one note of the musical scale and each ringer is responsible for playing four of the bells as needed in the music. Precise timing and team work, as well as sensitivity to the music, are essential. Watching the director is also a helpful thing to do!
